June Public Input Individual Session Data

Input from members of all communities within Manistee County is desired through this planning process, but with 21 local units of government within Manistee County the idea of holding 21 separate public input sessions raised concerns. The concerns revolved around the amount of time necessary to plan, setup and effectively capture public input, but also with the potential to have some input sessions lightly attended or without any attendance by the public whatsoever.

It was decided to effectively manage the public input with notification by conducting 6 public input sessions spread throughout the County. The locations were chosen based upon several factors easily identified locations, proximity to higher population centers, and ease of traveling to the location of the session for the public which resided in that region.

The Public Input Sessions were held at the following locations at the provided date and time.

Marilla Township Hall: June 2nd, 2015
 Stronach Township Hall: June 9th, 2015

• Brethren High School: June 11th, 2015 (low turnout)

Bear Lake United Methodist Church: June 16th, 2015
 Springdale Township Hall: June 23rd, 2015
 Manistee High School: June 30th, 2015

The format of the Public Input Sessions were conducted in a similar fashion to those for the Student Input Sessions. Through following that base format, the resulting information from all input sessions can be compared against each other. As with the student sessions, large maps were utilized to ascertain where and what type of activities in which were participated, within Manistee County. After then a discussion with three main questions was posed to the group. The questions outlined the strengths, weaknesses and opportunities of/for recreation within Manistee County. Unlike the student input sessions, the general public input sessions went one step further in order to prioritize opportunities which would help shape objectives for each of the individual municipalities and County as a whole. The prioritized goals for each municipality at the conclusion of all public input sessions could then be reviewed and revised by individual planning commissions and boards/councils with assistance by the leadership team member.

Marilla Township Hall Public Input Session:

With approximately 10 people attending the Marilla Township Hall Public Input Session, it was considered a rather light turnout. The communities of Marilla and Maple Grove Townships as well as the Village of Kaleva were represented. Those who did attend were passionate about recreation in Manistee County and there was no shortage of well-developed ideas. 


Figure ?. Springdale Twp. Hall Public Input Session Wordle

Student Input Individual Session Data:

To gather input from the County's youth, a group traditionally underrepresented in planning, a series of public input sessions were held at 3 area High Schools to solicit input on recreation activities from the youth of Manistee County. The first of the 3 sessions was conducted in February 2015 at Manistee High School. This session hosted youth from Bear Lake High School, Manistee Catholic Central and Manistee High School. The session was facilitated by the MSU Urban and Regional Planning Program Student Practicum Team as a portion of the work they completed for the County's Recreation Plan. The remaining two sessions were conducted in April. One session was held at Onekama High School and the other in Brethren at the KND (Kaleva, Norman, Dickson) High School. Each of these sessions only hosted students from within those schools and was facilitated by the County Planning Director and AES Community Development Director.

Each of the 3 sessions was conducted in the same manner. Large maps of the County, which identified recreation lands, sites, trails, and waterways, were utilized to ascertain where the youth of the County chose to recreate during the summer and winter. The students were given two different color sticky dots and asked to place them on the map and write on or next to the dot, the type of recreation activity they enjoy doing in those locations. Next the students were asked to identify both strengths and weaknesses as it pertained to recreation sites or opportunities within Manistee County. Lastly the students were asked to brainstorm and provide a vision for what they would like to see recreation wise in Manistee County in the future.

Manistee High School Student Input Session:

With approximately 50 High School students the Manistee High School student input session had the largest attendance. Several MSU Students facilitated the input session by guiding groups of students through the process as was described above. The results of each segment of the input session are organized within the Wordle, the Activity Table, Strengths and Weaknesses Table and bulleted Visioning Results.
